COURSE DESCRIPTION

Overview of revenue sources for schools: federal, state, and local funding. This course will cover basic terms, factors that determine each district's funding, reporting and distribution deadlines, and common missteps and errors that jeopardize funding.

COURSE GOALS

1. Students should understand the three major sources of funding:
 - a. Federal: Common federal funding sources (e.g., Title I) and limits on how these funds are spent.
 - b. State: How is state aid determined under the new funding formula?
 - c. Local: What is a mill? How does a district determine number of mills to levy? What are the different types of levies (general fund, building, and miscellaneous mills)?
2. Students should know state and federal funding reporting deadlines and when funds are dispersed to schools by DPI.

3. Students should be able to read and understand a DPI state aid projection sheet.
4. Students should understand budget hearing requirements under NDCC 57-15-02.2.

DESCRIPTION OF ASSIGNMENTS & FINAL ASSESSMENT

- Reading assignments for this course are as follows. Please read Chapters 1 and 2 of Understanding School Finance. Please review the Title I General Requirements and Title II, Part A, Allowable Use of Funds. Please printout out and review Finance Facts and the State Aid reports. All documents are listed above.
 - Final assessment: The final assessment for this class will be worth 80 points. The instructor will provide you with guidance on this final assessment during class. The final assessment for this class will consist of a budgeting exercise. The due date is **November 30, 2023**.

GRADES

Grades will be calculated on a 100 point scale and based on attendance 10 points, class participation 10 points, and the final exam 80 points. The grading scale is as follows:

85 – 100 = Mastery (M): Student has completed proficient work on all course objectives and advanced work on some objectives.

70 – 84 = Proficient (P): Student has completed proficient work on the majority of and/or most important objectives, although not on all objectives. Students must receive at least a proficient to pass a course.

00 – 69 = Developing (D): Student is missing a majority of and/or important objectives and is consequently at significant risk of failing the next related course or being unable to perform the skills covered in the course. Students who receive this designation will be required to retake the course.

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

Academic dishonesty includes, but is not limited to, cheating on a test, plagiarism, and collusion (as defined in the NDSBMCP Student Handbook) and is prohibited. Academic dishonesty may be treated as an academic matter or as a disciplinary matter at the discretion of the instructor. The instructor may reflect the incident of dishonesty in the student's grade. If the student has a grievance related to this action, that grievance may be filed in accordance with the NDSBMCP grading grievance procedure. Alternatively, the instructor may refer the case as a disciplinary matter to the NDSBA Executive Director, who is authorized to take disciplinary action, which may include, but not be limited to, withholding course credit, suspending participation in the program, or permanently removing the individual from the program. Prior to making a disciplinary decision, the NDSBA Executive Director will meet with the student, provide a detailed list of charges against them, the corroborating evidence, and offer them an opportunity to respond.
